<u>Topics:</u> Sibling support, Sibling relationships, Caregiver self-care, The benefits of support groups

<u>Bio:</u> Rachel Buxbaum Levy is the Licensed Social Worker at JAFCO (Jewish Adoption and Family Care Options). Established in 1992, JAFCO's mission is to care for abused and neglected children and those with disabilities in the Jewish community and to work in partnership with families and the entire community. We believe that the care of children in our community is our responsibility, one we accept with joy, pride and love. JAFCO is currently serving over 500 children and their families in the Philadelphia and South Florida communities through our complete continuum of services. Rachel is a proud Philadelphia native who has dedicated her career in social work to children and families. Rachel is available to give presentations on inclusion, sibling relationships, self-care of the caregiver, child abuse and neglect in the Jewish community and how to become a foster/adoptive parent.

Michelle has experience working with people with special needs in a variety of settings, including religious schools, camps, and residential facilities as well as experience training both teens and adult teachers to work with students with special needs.

Her most recent book The Little Gate Crasher is a memoir of her Great-Uncle, who overcame society's prejudices about dwarfism to lead a remarkable life. She's also written The Kitchen Classroom, a children's cookbook designed for children of all abilities. Gabby holds a B.F.A. in theatre and creative writing from Emerson College and an M.A. in Jewish Studies from the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College.

<u>Topics:</u> Inclusion and adaptations for teens and adults with Autism &/or Intellectual Disabilities in a variety of settings (synagogue and Jewish teen/YA programs, workplace, independent living). I often co-present with JCHAI members who share about their lives.

Bio: JCHAI, Judith Creed Homes for Adult Independence, was built by local families who wanted their young adult family members (18 & up) having disabilities to have the range of post High School opportunities for employment, friendship, community and independent living that all young people desire. As JCHAI's Director of Community Engagement & Program Development, Dr. Beth Rosenwasser engages Philadelphia region businesses to learn about the benefits of employing people with disabilities and people at local synagogues and organizations to facilitate inclusion of people with Autism and Intellectual Disables. A behavioral clinician and President of Philadelphia Behavior Therapy Association, before joining the JCHAI team, she designed and directed treatment programs for children and adults with a range of developmental and behavioral health needs.
